Leila is a final-year Human, Social and Political Sciences student at The University of Cambridge. She is currently a Talent Research and Development Intern at The Black British Business Awards primarily assisting on social media strategy and marketing. At university, Leila is actively involved with life on campus: performing in plays, producing 'The Festival of New Writing', holding the post of JCR Treasurer, and writing and editing at The Tab Cambridge in multiple sections. Most notably, she co-founded 'Your College Aunts': an agony aunt-style podcast and column where the problems of Cambridge students are deconstructed, and solutions offered on topics ranging rom romance to workload and mental health.

Diagnosed with ADHD amid a pandemic (and a positive coronavirus test) she is passionate about destigmatising conversations surrounding mental health and neurodivergence, with this culminating in the creation of a Tab article/resource focused on mental health support for students during the pandemic.

In April 2021, Leila wrote an open letter to her former secondary school, on the issues of sexual harassment and misogyny in the classroom, which gained over 500 signatures and testimonies in two days, resulting in coverage in The Telegraph. Since its publication, she has participated in many discussions on the topics of misogyny and harassment in the classroom, featuring as a guest on the 'Schools Should Be Podcast.' Leila continues to be passionate about the cause and has started to collaborate with other young women who wrote similar letters to push for deeper change.

HARRY MOORE

MA Psychology, founder of Fitness YouTube Channel, Team for Never Lean

Harry, a Psychology Postgraduate, has worked within the fitness industry for nearly ten years. His passion for fitness stemmed from mental health struggles that he battled with throughout his teenage years, primarily surrounding body image, depression, and anxiety. Although these struggles encouraged him to embark on his own fitness journey, they also contributed to his interest in the realm of Psychology but more specifically, mental health. It is for these reasons that Harry has shifted a lot of his attention to bridging the gap between physical and emotional health, through his YouTube channel, Team For Never Lean (TFNL), which has amassed a YouTube following of over 20 000 subscribers.

TFNL was initially established as a means of debunking toxic fitness myths that too many have fallen victim to. It has since developed into a community, a safe space, for like-minded individuals actively encouraging each other to become the best version of themselves whilst actively trying to limit social comparisons. The world has raised many of us to shy away from discussing sensitive subjects due to the stigma surrounding mental health, so Harry aims to break down these walls and encourage such conversations to promote positive emo0tional and mental health, despite how difficult that may be. Harry's extensive experiences with social media include the good, the bad and the ugly, which many of the younger generation now see but are not always equipped to manage. Through his work, Harry also aims to support young people with the resilience and teaching necessary to navigate the online world.

Harry supports his clients with Performance Coaching (Psychological and physical), Crisis volunteering, and is soon to become a counsellor.
