David Almond	<b>The Colour of the Sun</b> One hot summer morning, Davie steps boldly out of his front door. A boy has been killed, and Davie thinks he might know who is responsible. He turns away from the gossip and excitement and sets off roaming towards the sunlit hills about the town. As the day goes on, the real and imaginary start to merge, and Davie knows that neither he nor his world will ever be the same again
Kirsty Applebaum	<b>Troofriend</b> What if you could have the perfect best friend? Someone who would never argue with you and was always on your side? What if you could choose their hairstyle, their clothes, the colour of their eyes? What if they would do anything for you? Would it matter if they weren't human.
Kirsty Applebaum	<b>The Middler</b> Maggie's never thought much about the Quiet War. It's just somewhere the eldest kids get sent when they turn fourteen, like her big brother, Jed. But when she meets Una, a wanderer from outside the town boundary, she starts to see things differently. What if everything she's been told is wrong?

It's not just the horrific discovery she makes among the trees, it's what's waiting for her at home. Something too terrifying to believe in. She's not even sure she believes it herself.
Sita Brahmachari	When Secrets set Sail Years ago, it was The House of the Ayahs, giving shelter to nannies who couldn't return to their homeland. Now, it is a refugee centre – facing the threat of closure. Quiet Usha instantly clashes with fiery new arrival Imitiaz. But then a surprising visitor delivers a message: a broken promise from the house's past must be fixed. Only by working together can the girls set the secrets of generations free, and save their home
Jess Butterworth	<b>Running on the Roof of the World</b> After twelve-year old Tash's parents are seized by soldiers, she and her best friend Sam resolve to rescue them. However, to do so, they must escape Tibet, cross the mountains and seek help from the Dalai Lama in India. An extraordinary journey begins

Lauren Child	Ruby Redfort (Books 1-6 Look into my Eyes; Take your last Breath; Catch your Death; Feel the Fear; Pick your Poison; Blink and you Die) A genius code-cracker, a daring detective, and a gadget-laden special agent who just happens to be a thirteen-year-old girl.
Chris Columbus	The House of Secrets (Book 1 of 3) When Brendan, Cordelia and Nell move to Kristoff House they have no idea that they are about to unleash the dark magic locked within. Now the Walker kids must battle against deadly pirates, bloodthirsty warriors and a bone-crunching giant. If they fail they will never see their parents again and a crazed witch will take over the world
Andreina Cordani	<b>The Girl Who</b> Leah is the perfect survivor. She was seven years old when she saw her mother and sister killed by a troubled young man. Her case hit the headlines and her bravery made her a national sweetheart: strong, courageous and forgiving. But Leah is hiding a secret about their deaths. And now, ten years later, all she can think of is revenge.
Emily Diamand	<b>Flood Child</b> Flood Child is set in the 22nd Century, in a partially flooded England. Following climate change, the surviving English have gone back to simpler ways turning their backs on a technological past while Scotland is in the ascendancy, seeking to expand its borders and power-base. Both must deal with the Reavers, troublesome piratical tribes who pillage the waterways. Lilly Melkun, an English fisher-girl, is out sailing with her sea-cat when the bloodthirsty Reavers come raiding - and kidnap the Prime Minister's daughter. Her village in turmoil, Lilly decides to find the girl. In a daring sea dash she sets out with an extraordinary ransom tucked inside her belt: a mysterious talking jewel from a past computer age, that she later discovers everybody wants.
Kate DiCamillo	Louisiana's Way Home (Carnegie 2020 Longlist) When Louisiana's granny tells her they must leave town – now! – to flee an ancient curse, Louisiana figures she will soon changer her mind. After all, Granny can be <i>very</i> melodramatic. But Granny does not intend for them to return. Ever. Far away from her friends and everything she knows, Louisiana struggles to oppose the winds of fate and to find her way home. Could it be that she is destined only for goodbyes?
Kate DiCamillo	<b>Beverly, Right Here</b> Beverly Tapinski has run away from home plenty of times before, but now that she's fourteen she figures it's not running away. It's leaving. Determined to make it on her own, Beverly finds a job and a place to live and resolves not to depend on anyone – or to have anyone depend on her. But despite her best efforts, she can't help forming connections with those around her. And as she does, Beverly begins to see herself through their eyes.
Jennifer Donnelly	A Gathering Light (Carnegie Winner 2003) Mattie is torn between her familial responsibilities, her desire to be a writer, and the excitement of a first romance. Her dilemmas and choices are quietly reflected in the life of a young woman found drowned in a lake, a woman that Mattie only gets to know through reading her letters. When finally the tales of Mattie and the drowned girl merge, their stories beautifully combine in a brilliant and perfect conclusion
Tonke Dragt	The Letter for the King When Tiuri answers a desperate call for help, he finds himself on a perilous mission that could cost him his life. He must deliver a secret letter to the King who lives across the Great Mountains – a letter upon which the future of the entire realm depends. It means abandoning home, breaking all the rules and leaving everything behind – even the knighthood he has dreamed of for so long
Sarah Driver	<b>Sea</b> Ever since Ma died, Mouse has looked after her little brother, Sparrow, dreaming of her destiny as captain of The Huntress. Now Da's missing, Sparrow is in danger, and a deathly cold is creeping across the world

Timothee de Fombelle **Alma: The Wind Rises** It is 1786. Alma lives with her family in an African valley. She spends her days exploring their blissful homeland. But everything changes when her little brother finds a secret way out of the valley. Alma sets out to find him but soon has to face terrible dangers in a continent ravaged by the violence and horrors of the slave trade. The journey to bring her brother home soon becomes a thrilling adventure to save herself, her family, and the memory of her people

Kathleen Glasgow **The Agathas** After falling from grace last summer, Agatha Christie-obsessed Alice Ogilvie needs to stay out of trouble. While smart and reclusive Iris Adams just want to get out of Castle Cove. But now they have a murder to solve. There are clues the police are ignoring, a list of suspects a mile long and some very dangerous cliffs. Amateur detectives Alice and Iris are about to uncover just how many secrets their sleepy seaside town is hiding....

- Connie Glynn Undercover Princess (Book 1 of The Rosewood Chronicles) All I've ever wanted is to NOT be a princess. And then I end up getting roomed with a girl who's obsessed with them. Lottie Pumpkin is an ordinary girl who longs to be a princess. Ellie Wolf is a princess who longs to be ordinary. When the two girls end up in the same dorm at Rosewood Hall boarding school, they make the decision to swap identities. But someone seems to have figured out what they've done, and – as Lottie quickly learns – life at Rosewood is much more complicated than in the fairy tales she loves....
- Connie Glynn **Princess in Practice (Book 2 of The Rosewood Chronicles)** Lottie Pumpkin is an ordinary girl who plays a princess to the outside world. Ellie Wolf is the princess she is protecting from prying eyes. At Rosewood Hall boarding school, Lottie and Ellie must hide who they are from everyone. But theirs isn't the only secret. Students are being poisoned and no one knows why. It falls to Lottie and Ellie to find the truth before danger finds them first....

When they inherit three magical objects with the power to change their fate, adventure beckons. But are they being led into even greater danger?
Lena Jones	<b>The Secret Key (Book 1 of the Agatha Oddly Series)</b> Agatha Oddlow has been a detective for as long as she can remember – she's just been waiting for her first big case. And nothing gets bigger than saving the city of London from some strange goings-on. With a home in the middle of Hyde Park, a room full of beloved sleuthing novels and a secret key that gives her access to a whole hidden side of London, Agatha is perfectly poised to solve this mystery. Nick Lake	<b>Nowhere on Earth (Carnegie 2020 Longlist)</b> It starts with a plane crash. There are survivors: a teenage girl and her little brother. They are running from something. But what? Then the men arrive. They are hunting the girl and boy. And – and that's all we can tell you
Richard Lambert	The Wolf Road (Carnegie Longlist 2022) When Lucas survives the car accident that kills his parents, one memory stays with him – of the wolf that caused the crash. Forced to leave his home and live with his nan in the remote wilderness of the Lake District, Lucas struggles to adjust to his strange, new world. And when he learns that a wild creature is killing livestock on the mountains, he knows it's the wolf, that it's come for him, and that he must face it.
Bren MacDibble	Across the Risen Sea Neoma and Jag and their small community are 'living gentle lives' on high ground surrounded by the risen sea. When strangers from the Valley of the Sun arrive unannounced, the two friends find themselves drawn into a web of secrecy and lies that endangers their whole way of life. Soon daring, loyal Neoma must set off on a solo mission across the risen sea, determined to rescue her best friend and find the truth that will save her village.
John Marsden	<b>Tomorrow when the war began</b> The astonishing adventure beginsEllie Linton wants one final adventure with her friends before the school holidays are over. Packed in Ellie's parents' car, they drive to a famously beautiful camp in the hills. Returning to their home town of Wirrawee, the seven teenagers realize that something is seriously wrong. Their world has changed forever. Would you give up everything? Would you fight? Would you sacrifice life itself?
Hilary McKay	The Time of Green Magic Abi and her two step-brothers, Max and Louis, find that strange things happen when they are alone in their eerie, ivy-coloured new house. Abi, reading alone, finds herself tumbling deep into books, while Louis summons a startling guest through his bedroom window. Even Max has started to notice shapes in the

	shadows. Their busy parents see none of it – but Louis' secret visitor is growing too alarming to keep hidden, and he finds he cannot manage without Max and Abi's help. Can they find out where the mysterious creature has come from – and how to get it back there?
Nadia Mikail	<b>The Cats we meet along the way</b> Aisha hasn't seen her sister for a long time. Two years ago, June left the family home and didn't look back, taking her pink hair and her strong, stubborn personality with her. But now time is running out and priorities have changed. With her boyfriend and his parents (as well as a stray cat called Fleabag), Aisha and her Mak take a roadtrip through Malaysia in search of June – hoping to put the past to rest, to come to terms with the present, and perhaps even to hope for the future.
Ross Montgomery	<b>The Midnight Guardians</b> When evacuee Col's childhood imaginary friends come to life, he discovers a world where myths and legends are real. But they bring dire news: Col's sister is in danger. Together with his guardians – a six-foot tiger, a badger in a waistcoat and a miniature knight – Col must race to Blitz-bombed London to save her. But there are darker forces at work, even than the Nazi bombings. Soon Col is pursued by the terrifying Midwinter King, who is determined to bring an eternal darkness down over everything.
Mal Peet	<b>Tamar (Carnegie Winner 2005)</b> In the Hunger Winter of 1944, two English spies parachute into Nazi-occupied Holland. Half a century later, a fifteen year old girl named Tamar inherits a box containing a sequence of clues and coded messages from her grandfather. From the past, another Tamar emerges – a man involved in the terrifying world of resistance fighters – and she is his namesake. She unravels a complex story of passionate love, jealousy and tragedy set against the daily fear and casual horror of the Second World War
Nicola Penfold	<b>Between Sea and Sky</b> Pearl and her younger sister Clover live on their floating oyster farm, isolated from those living on a land ravaged by environmental disasters. They spend their days swimming with porpoises and exploring the mudflats, but life is still far from carefree. Clover is an illegal second child – and Pearl will do anything to protect her.
Nicola Penfold	Where the World turns Wild For Juniper and her little brother Bear, escaping their cage of a city has always been a secret dream. But when scientists discover the siblings are key to a merciless plan, their escape becomes more than that. Now it's a flight for their lives. As Juniper and Bear journey further from the city, they soon learn that there's cruelty in nature as well as beauty. Will they ever find the home they're searching for?
Sara Pennypacker	<b>Pax</b> Pax and Peter have been inseparable ever since Peter rescued him as a cub but when Peter is forced to return his fox to the wild, his world is torn apart. Despite the encroaching war, and the three hundred miles between them, Peter sets out to find his fox. Meanwhile Pax waits hopefully for his boy
Chris Priestley	Seven Ghosts Jake and the other finalists in a story-writing competition have been invited to a stately home for a tour like no other. As their guide leads them through grand rooms, hidden nooks and magnificent grounds, they are about to hear the stories of seven ghosts who haunt these walls. But strange shapes and shadows follow Jake as he journeys through the house. The tour guide's behaviour becomes ever more suspicious. With each tale that he hears, Jake begins to feel more uneasy, and soon he will discover that something is very, very wrong

Tonight, Arturo must gamble not only for his friend's freedom, but for his friend's life – while his own hangs in the balance. Can he cheat Death herself? Sherri L. Lauren Wolk	<b>Echo Mountain (Carnegie Shortlist 2021)</b> By the time our first mountain winter came, we had a snug, safe home with four good rooms – one for us children, on for our parents, one for our kitchen, and one for everything else. A root cellar for what we'd grown the whole summer long. A place where we could start again. But that was before my father's accident changed everything.
Lauren Wolk	<b>Beyond the Bright Sea</b> Twelve-year old Crow has lived her entire life on a tiny, isolated piece of the starkly beautiful Elizabeth Islands in Massachusetts. In this perfect comedy of manners, the heroine learns to come to terms with the reality of other people, and with her own erring nature, but in the process the small town of Highbury is convulsed by Emma's ill-judged schemes.
- Lucy M. Boston **The Children of Green Knowe** Tolly's great-grandmother isn't a witch, but both she and her old house Green Knowe are full of a very special kind of magic. Green Knowe is not the lonely place Tolly has imagined. There are other children living in the house....children who had been happy there centuries before.

Emily Bronte Wuthering Heights The story of Heathcliff, an orphan who falls in love with a girl above his class, loses her, and devotes the rest of his life to inflicting revenge on her family. In early nineteenth-century Yorkshire, the passionate attachment between a headstrong young girl and an outcast boy brought up by her father causes disaster for them and many others, even in the next generation.

Agatha Christie **The ABC Murders** There is a serial killer on the loose, bent on working his way through the alphabet and as a macabre calling card he leaves beside each victim's corpse the ABC Railway Guide open at the name of the town where the murder has taken place. Having begun with Andover, Bexhill and then Churston, there seems little chance of the murderer being caught – until he makes the crucial and vain mistake of challenging Hercule Poirot to frustrate his plans.

Arthur Conan Doyle A Study in Scarlet (Holmes and Watson's first mystery) Holmes and Watson are summoned to a south London house, where they find a dead man whose contorted face

	is a twisted mask of horror. The body is unmarked by violence but on the wall a mysterious word has been written in blood.
